CHAIRPERSON'S REPORT

2014 was a year of steady growth and development for the Irish Youth Foundation, both in terms of funds generated, and grants distributed. In a year where 80% of Irish charities experienced falling incomes or stagnation (*The Wheel – The State of Ireland's Non-Profit Sector 2014*), we are very grateful to our donors for their continued support and belief in our organisation. The Irish Youth Foundation invested €286,534 in charitable programmes and grants to groups working with vulnerable and at-risk children in Ireland. This is an increase of 11.6% on the previous 12 months. A total of 83 individual grants were awarded this period.

Of note among these was a grant of €50,000 to the Bradog Youth Group's Bicycle Programme - for Inner-city North Dublin Youth (INDY Bikes). This programme supports children and young people aged 10–21 in an area with serious poverty and social exclusion issues; unemployment, separated families, drug abuse, low education/training levels and homelessness. The programme teaches bike repairs and maintenance giving local young people a concrete skill in a sector that has a deficit of qualified mechanics; it promotes the fitness, health and environmental benefits of cycling; and it develops local leaders and role models.

The Transition from Primary to Secondary School pilot research project was successfully completed and I would like to thank Billy Murphy and the four participating organisations (Citywise in Tallaght, Solas in Dublin 8, Kildare Youth Services and the Aisling Project in Ballymun) for their valuable input. The knowledge gained from this pilot will provide the basis of the Transition Tool Kit which it is our goal to develop in 2015. Our aim is for this to be made available to all groups helping vulnerable children to make the successful transition from primary to secondary education.

2014 was an important year for YouthBank (YB). Previously a joint partnership between the IYF, the Community Foundation of Ireland, and the Community Foundation of Northern Ireland, this unique grant-making programme is now solely supported by IYF. Edel Maughan, YB Manager is now responsible for all 15 YouthBanks on the island of Ireland (12 in the South and 3 Northern Ireland).

In headline terms YouthBank's 140 trained grant-makers gave out 62 grants to the value of €25,000, reaching an impressive 5,120 primary beneficiaries this year. A total of €14,088 was fundraised by young people for their own projects creating a great sense of ownership in each YouthBank. Edel also oversaw a rebrand of the YouthBank brand and website and the programme is now in an excellent position for growth and investment.

IYF continued our series of Cardboard Challenges in partnership with Smurfit Kappa, providing a creative outlet to 166 children experiencing educational and social disadvantage from 26 homework clubs. In addition to the workshops in Dublin, Belfast, Waterford, Galway and Cork, we also facilitated 800 young people at the National Ploughing Championships in Stradbally over three days in September.

From a fundraising perspective we were delighted that so many new companies showed their support for IYF, either as donors, supporters or event attendees. As we enter our 30th year as an organisation it is very encouraging to see new Irish and International companies taking an interest in supporting the work that we do.

We held our first ever golf fundraising event in 2014. A big thank you to the 26 teams who took part in the 4th July Jaguar Golf Classic in the K Club and helped us to raise €40,000, and of course to Jaguar for sponsoring the event. We hope to make this an annual event and welcome the American Chamber of Commerce in Ireland who will partner with us in 2015.

CHAIRPERSON'S (CONTINUED)

We were delighted to be chosen as one of the three partner charities for the Tour de Picnic cycle to the Electric Picnic Festival. Over a thousand cyclists and runners took part and raised €20,000 for the IYF at this wonderful weekend which introduced the charity to a whole new audience of music lovers. To continue the cycling theme seven riders raised almost €42,000 by cycling from Paris to Nice, the second year that IYF has entered a team into this great event.

After taking a break in 2013, the Excellence in Sports Awards was back on the IYF calendar again as our biggest fundraising event of the year. A special mention and sincere thanks are due to Padraig Harrington who hosted the event and became an official IYF ambassador. The rejuvenated awards, run independently by IYF staff for the first time, was a great success with new presenters, new sports stars and many new companies attending and supporting.

I would also like to thank the companies and individuals who continued to support for our Bloomsday Messenger Bike Rally & Lunch, sponsored by Brennan's Bread, and the Children's Hour and Denim Day campaigns.

IYF continues to be committed to adhering to the highest levels of governance standards available to our organisation. 2014 saw us sign up to the Governance Code and all fundraising activities were run in full compliance of the ICTR Fundraising Guidelines.

I would like to take this opportunity to thank the IYF staff members and my fellow board members for their time, expertise and dedication to the Irish Youth Foundation.

Finally, I would like to salute everyone involved in and associated with the Irish Youth Foundation for their ongoing support and encouragement.

We are very grateful for your support and kindness.

DIRECTOR'S REPORT

The directors have the pleasure to present their report and the audited financial statements for the financial year ended 31 December 2014.

LEGAL STATUS

Irish Youth Foundation is a company incorporated under the Companies Act 2014, limited by guarantee and not having share capital. The Foundation has been granted charitable status by the Revenue Commissioners.

VISION

The vision of Irish Youth Foundation is to support projects and programmes that make a positive difference to children and young people facing adversity in their lives.

MISSION STATEMENT

Through its work, Irish Youth Foundation aims to promote standards of excellence in programmes for young people that:

- Enable young people, aged between 8 and 12, to stay in school and make the critical transition from primary to secondary education by resourcing after school programmes which provide homework time, food for health and activities that promote pro-social behaviours.
- Support young people, aged between 16 and 21, to become more actively engaged in their local communities by providing them with the resources to create and implement their own actions.
- Assist preventative programmes for young people and children that promote their personal growth and development.
- Develop facilities and amenities for young people and children.
- Strengthen, expand and replicate programmes "that work".
- Improve the quantity and quality of our grant aid.

HOW WE MAKE A DIFFERENCE

IYF provides financial support in the form of grants to local community and voluntary youth groups working with at-risk and disadvantaged children, such as afterschool and homework clubs, summer programmes, sporting clubs, creative education projects and active citizenship activities. These groups provide safe places where children can go after school – to grow, to learn and to play.

For children who often experience poverty, parental misuse of drugs, and alcohol, crime and mental health issues, these projects are beacons of hope which enhance and improve their lives. Our grants also provide opportunities for teenagers from disadvantaged and under-served communities to succeed and excel in their lives.

In the last 30 years the IYF has raised over €20 million and supported 1,700 projects on the island of Ireland, reaching 50,000 young people directly.

FUNDRAISING

The IYF organises fundraising events and activities throughout the year (e.g. Excellence in Sports Awards, Bloomsday Bike Rally, Golf Classic, Children's Hour, Denim Day, Paris2Nice Cycle etc) and we rely totally on the support of individuals and companies for this support. IYF receives no financial support from Government. The Foundation has a number of loyal corporate supporters.

DIRECTOR'S REPORT (CONTINUED)

IYF GRANTS

IYF grants range from €250 for a small community project up to €50,000 for a larger capital project. In 2014 IYF continued its research and support in the area transition from primary to secondary school with an investment of €51,317.

Grants are applied for (online or by post) by community projects via grant rounds (e.g. Children's Hour) or in some cases IYF is approached directly by an organisation for a specific project (e.g. Bradog's INDY Bike Project). Grant applications are reviewed first by IYF staff and final decisions made by the Board.

ACTIVITIES FOR THE FINANCIAL YEAR AND FUTURE DEVELOPMENT

Our goal for 2014 was to stabilse our fundraised income levels while simultaneously increasing investment in charitable activity and programmes. Particular attention was given to replacing falling income from traditional campaigns (such as Children's Hour and Denim Day which are in long term decline) with alternative income streams.

Specifically our Objectives and Achievements were:

Objective:

Develop and diversify Funding Streams & Fundraising Events

Achievement:

Increased revenue from our existing fundraising events - e.g. Sports Awards (hosted for the first time independently by IYF), Bloomsday and Paris2Nice. New Fundraising streams were created - Jaguar 4th July Golf Classic and the Electric Picnic 'Tour de

Picnic.'

Objective:

Attract new corporate donors and increase corporate income

Achievement:

In 2014 IYF recruited a strong list of new companies as donors, supporters and/or event attendees. Direct corporate donations increased almost three-fold.

Objective:

Increase Positive Media Coverage for IYF

Achievement:

Strong media coverage for our main events including Cardboard Challenge, Paris 2 Nice, Bloomsday, 4th July Jaguar Golf Classic and Excellence in Sport Awards

Objective:

Strengthen IYF Corporate Governance

Achievement:

IYF submitted its annual report in accordance with the SORP accountancy requirements

and continued to review organisational finances on a quarterly basis.

IYF signed up to the Governance Code Principles and carried out all fundraising

activities in compliance with the Guidelines on Fundraising Principles.

A detailed analysis of fundraising income over the preceding four years was completed.

Key decisions were taken at board level regarding IYF reserve policy.

An Accounts Administrator was recruited on a part-time basis (one day a week)

Objective:

Complete the Transition from Primary to Secondary School Research Project

Achievement:

The Transition Project was successfully completed, following a follow-up investment of €51,317 in 2014, and the report was delivered to the Board by Billy Murphy. The next steps for this project will involve approaching partners who can assist in producing a flexible 'Transition Model Toolkit' for use by youth groups around the country

DIRECTOR'S REPORT (CONTINUED)

Objective:

Increase spend on grants and charitable activity

Achievement:

IYF spent €286,534 on grants and charitable activities during the financial year

compared with €256,670 for the previous 15 months.

Objective:

Establish the Youth Sector Funding Partnership

Achievement:

IYF's Youth Sector Funding programme was conceived, developed and established in 2014. This re-established a positive relationship with Foroige, Youth Work Ireland and National Youth Council of Ireland. There now exists excellent potential for growth in fundraising and grant distribution. The programme will be launched in 2015.

Objective:

Develop the future strategy for YouthBank

Achievement:

A new plan was developed by Edel Maughan designed to strengthen YouthBank in 2015 and grow it significantly into the future. This moves YouthBank back into the centre of IYF strategy and direction. New connections were made with prospective strategic partners and there now exists the potential for significant growth and investment for YouthBank.

IYF staff worked closely with the Chairman and Directors in maintaining the fundraising capacity of the organisation and in ensuring that grant commitments were discharged in a timely and effective manner.

RESULTS FOR THE FINANCIAL YEAR AND STATE OF AFFAIRS AT 31 DECEMBER 2014

The results for the financial year are set out on page 14. The net incoming resources show a deficit of €88,139 compared with a surplus of €37,113 in the previous financial year. These figures reflect the Reserves Policy decision to invest a percentage of financial reserves into furthering IYF activity and objectives, a policy which will continue in 2015 (see Reserves Policy, page 9).

The Directors have done their utmost to keep costs to a minimum and are committed to continually reviewing their budgeting and spending policies.

DIRECTOR'S REPORT (CONTINUED)

PLANS FOR 2015

In 2015 the goal for IYF is to continue to develop and diversify new income streams, grow our existing successful events, and specifically to increase corporate donations through developing new charity partnerships.

From a grant making perspective our objective is to continue to increase the number of grants distributed to our core demographic groups.

PRINCIPAL RISKS AND UNCERTAINTIES

Although there were early signs of recovery in the Irish economy in the past twelve months, the financial crisis is still affecting the charitable sector with 80% of charities experiencing stagnation or a decrease in their income in 2014 (*The Wheel – The State of Ireland's Non-Profit Sector 2014*). In addition the public's trust in charities has yet to be fully restored following the impropriety of certain organisations in 2013.

These two factors mean that the charitable sector is still in a state of uncertainty, albeit in a stronger position than 12 months ago, and all fundraising bodies continue to face considerable financial challenges.

DIVIDENDS AND DISTRIBUTION

The Company is precluded by its Memorandum of Association from paying dividends either as part of normal operations or on a distribution of its assets in the event of a winding-up.

STAFF AND VOLUNTEERS

The Board of IYF would like to express their appreciation for the dedication and commitment of its staff and for the valuable contribution they make to the work of the Foundation.

IYF is an equal opportunities employer. The aim of its equal opportunities policy is to ensure that all people receive equality of opportunity within IYF regardless of gender, race, religion, disability, nationality, marital status or sexual orientation.

DIRECTOR'S REPORT (CONTINUED)

RESERVES POLICY

IYF's policy is to maintain unrestricted reserves at a level which is equivalent to 12 months turnover to ensure the stability and long-term viability of the organisation, to ensure protection from fluctuations in income, and to allow immediate and efficient response to urgent needs which may arise subject to the foundation's objectives.

IYF's total unrestricted funds at the end of 2014 are €772,527. To reflect this policy, a portion of this reserve will be spent on projects in keeping with IYF's objectives in 2014, on decision by the Directors. Reserve levels are subject to annual review by the Directors.

Restricted funds represent grant income and donations received which are subject to conditions imposed by the donors or grant making institutions. They are not available for the general purposes of the charity. At the end of 2014 IYF held €10.667 in restricted reserves.

POST BALANCE SHEET EVENTS

There were no significant events affecting the company since the financial year end and the directors do not envisage any substantial changes to the nature of the business.

ORGANISATIONAL RISK

The directors believe that committing to a high level of corporate governance is essential to achieving the optimal standard of operation of the company's activities.

The Board of IYF has undertaken to adhere to the strictest governance codes available to the organisation. These include The Governance Code and the ICTR Fundraising Guidelines.

The Board has a competent executive team. There is clear division of responsibility at the company with the Board retaining control of major decisions, with the Director Of Development responsible for devising strategy and policy within the authority delegated to him by the Board.

The Board is responsible for providing leadership, setting strategy and ensuring control.

The company has a clear and detailed process for reporting management information to the Board. The Board is provided with regular information, which includes key performance and risk indicators for all aspects of the organisation. The Board meets regularly as required and met five times during 2014.

The directors recognise their overall responsibility for Irish Youth Foundation's systems of internal control and for reviewing their effectiveness. They have delegated responsibility for the implementation of this system to the executive team. This system includes financial controls, which enable the Board to meet its responsibilities for the integrity and accuracy of the company's accounting records.

Sub committees established for good governance (not confined to Board members) are:

AUDIT COMMITTEE

The function of the Audit Committee is to review internal financial controls, treasury and risk management processes. It liaises with external auditors and reports directly to the Board. It also monitors and reviews the financial performance of the company. It provides an independent review of the annual budgets, management and financial accounts and makes recommendations to the Board where relevant.

DIRECTOR'S REPORT (CONTINUED)

RESEARCH COMMITTEE

This Committee is charged with considering key decisions relating to the support of our activities. In particular, it has the following delegated responsibilities:

Appraisal of Grant applications and recommending acceptance of programs and project Monitoring the use of funds allocated by the Foundation.

Undertaking a programme of action research focusing on the problem facing young people and developing practical ways of tackling them.

ACCOUNTING RECORDS

The measures that the directors have taken to secure compliance with the requirements of sections 281 to 285 of the Companies Act 2014 with regard to the keeping of accounting records, are the employment of appropriately qualified accounting personnel and the maintenance of computerised accounting systems. The company's accounting records are maintained at the company's registered office at Dogpatch Labs, Unit 1, The CHQ Building, Custom House Quay, Dublin 1.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE FINANCIAL YEAR ENDED 31 DECEMBER 2014

1. STATUS OF IRISH YOUTH FOUNDATION

The company, which is limited by guarantee and not having a share capital, is incorporated in the Republic of Ireland and was formed to provide grants for the following activities:

- (a) The provision and organisation of centres for educational training and research into youth and development.
- (b) Projects and programmes proposed by the National Federation of Youth Clubs and other groups and/or youth organisations.

2.1 BASIS OF PREPARATION

Format of financial statements

The Irish Youth Foundation is constituted under Irish company law as a company limited by guarantee and is a registered charity. In prior years, company law scoped out companies not trading for gain for the members from the requirements with regard to formats and content of financial statements which applied to for profit companies, thus permitting the adoption of a format appropriate to a charity. Accordingly, the Society adopted and reported its performance in accordance with the format provided for in the Statement of Recommended Practice ("SORP") (revised 2005) "Accounting and Reporting by Charities" and in particular reports its performance for the financial year in the format of the SORP's Statement of Financial Activities ("SOFA").

The Companies Act 2014 became effective in law on 1 June 2015 and from that date applies the format and content of financial statements requirements appropriate for a company trading for the profit of its members to a company that is a not for profit organisation such as the Society.

In order to provide information relevant to understanding the stewardship of the directors and the performance and financial position of the Charity, the Society has prepared its financial statements in accordance with the formats provided for in the Charities SORP, consistent with the prior year.

Had the Companies Act format and content of financial statements requirements suitable for a company trading for the profit of its members been presented instead, a profit and loss account with related notes showing items such as Turnover and Cost of Sales would have been reported along with a "profit" on ordinary activities before taxation.

Basis of Preparation

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention. The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with accounting standards generally accepted in Ireland and Irish statute comprising the Companies Acts 2014 as applied in accordance with the Statement of Recommended Practice ("SORP") (revised 2005) "Accounting and Reporting by Charities" as published by the Charity Commission for England and Wales, who are recognised by the Financial Reporting Council as the appropriate body to issue SORPs for the charity sector in the UK. Financial reporting in line with the SORP is considered best practice for charities in Ireland. As noted above, the directors consider the adoption of the SORP requirements is the most appropriate accounting to properly reflect and disclose the activities of the organisation.

RECOGNITION OF INCOME 2.2

- Public donations, corporate donations and similar income arising from fundraising events are accounted for when received, except that funds received in the financial year/period conditional on expenditure not yet incurred is deferred.
- Grant income from operating activities, in furtherance of the charity's objects is accounted for on ii. a receivable basis.
- Interest income is recognised in the financial year/period in which it is earned. iii.

RECOGNITION OF EXPENDITURE

- Expenditure is analysed between charitable activities (activities in furtherance of the charity's objects), costs of generating voluntary income, and governance costs.
- The costs of each activity have been separately accumulated and disclosed. Expenditure is ii. recognised in the financial year/period to which it relates. Expenditure incurred but unpaid at the balance sheet date is included in accruals and other creditors. Charitable expenditure comprises all expenditure incurred by the charity in meeting its charitable objectives as opposed to the costs of raising funds to finance these activities, or the costs associated with governance. Publicity costs are included under the costs of generating funds due to the nature of the costs being linked to the raising of funds in furtherance of the charity's objects.
- Certain wages was apportion in according with time spend on each activity iii.

CHARITABLE ACTIVITIES 2.3

Charitable activities are charged in the income and expenditure account.

TANGIBLE ASSETS AND DEPRECIATION 2.4

Depreciation is calculated to write off the original cost of the fixed assets over their expected useful lives at the following annual rates on a straight line basis:
